"Of course not," I replied as I grabbed the basket, swung on my lovely new red cloak and set off through the woods.


It was a bright sunny day, but as I went under the trees it became gloomy and I sang to myself to keep cheerful.

Extension - Tally charts


Children were asked what their favourite fruit was. The answers are shown below:


