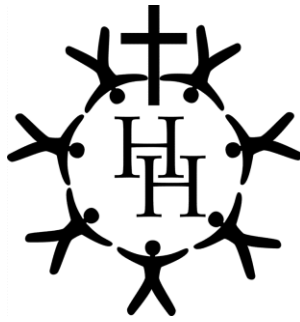

Dear Parents/Carers,

The internet and online technologies are an important part of children's lives at home and school, providing great opportunities for learning, communicating, playing and creating. As we know, these technologies create huge opportunities for us all, however, they can sometimes be a bit overwhelming, and present challenges to keeping your family safe online.

Here at Hanging Heaton C of E (VC) J & I School we go to great lengths to keep your child safe whilst using the internet in school. However, it is recognised by all leading agencies that using the internet can never be 100% safe. We have an Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) which outlines to you and your children safe working practices and procedures and we are routinely conducting E-safety workshops and dedicated E-safety classes. Details of our policies are available on the website or from school.

As part of our school discussions, we have been alarmed to hear of the number of children who suggest that they are involved in online chats with people that they had never met, i.e. via Xbox live and/or Facebook. These children were not purely those in Year 5 or 6 but also involved some of our younger children. We consider how best to keep safe and discussions led to how we know that these 'strangers' may or may not pose a danger to us.

Some of our children have also suggested that they have access to 18 certificate games, e.g. Grand Theft Auto, the series which has gained controversy for its adult nature and violent themes. Whilst we appreciate that some of the conversations may be exaggerated, we believe that it is our responsibility, along with yourselves, to help support and safeguard your children. Indeed we would not want some of our children not currently using these technologies and games to be influenced into doing so. On this note, we would appreciate that you have a discussion with your child as to how to minimise any dangers that they may be exposing themselves to and involve yourself with any online activities in which they may be participating, including ensuring that online activities take place only in the presence of a responsible adult.

Technology has many benefits, but as you hear in the news, it also has many dangers, attached are some useful resources to ensuring your child is safe on the internet at home.
